Second Window Programmes

Why Second Windows?

- Some Cricket clubs have historically shut their doors in July, just when school holidays are beginning
- Cricket will be more visible during July and August than at any other point during the summer
- We want Cricket to be competitive with other sports during that key summer holiday period, and in the post Covid-19 world we operate in

What are the benefits?

The second window initiative in 2021, saw:

- 1,650 clubs opening their doors
- 230% increase in junior activity during August
- 930 national programmes, 13,500 participants
- Doubled the number of girl's sign ups
- Dynamos 60% participants from ethnic backgrounds signed up post 7th May

What could your club do (Inspired to Play can help)?

Inspired to Play Grant Scheme

Aims:

• To increase the number of boys and girls aged under 18 years, participating between June – September 2022

Eligibility:

• Affiliated Clubs, £1,000 per eligible applicant

What could I apply for?

- Activity that drives new or existing girls' sections
- Official All Stars Cricket or Dynamos Cricket
- programmes
- Summer School programmes, such as cricket
- · camps for children.
- Activity that drives inclusion based initiatives.
- Other recreational cricket activity delivered to children



Inspired to Play Grant Scheme

Process:

- Online application via the ECB Investment Management System (IMS), which is accessible from: https://ims.ecb.co.uk
- County Board approval
- Quick, simple process. Minimal information needed

Timeframes:


- 31 May 2022 The Scheme will close to applications (or when the funds run out, whichever is earlier).
- 30 September 2022 Closing date for activity to be delivered and claims submitted.

ECB Safe Hands Management System

- Introduced to support clubs with ensuring individuals and volunteers have valid qualifications for their roles
- Clubs are required to register the details of individuals in key roles responsible for the management and running of club activities
- The system has <u>not</u> replaced the Clubmark process but does form part of it
- Digitises the process of keeping key workforce information and qualifications
- A system to improve safeguarding standards and ensure a safer game as a result



Benefits of Safe Hands Management System

- A user-friendly, online system which is readily accessible
- Allows clubs to proactively manage safeguarding compliance with the legal requirements of members in key roles and their qualifications i.e. DBS and Safeguarding
- Does require work up front to get everything online, but beyond this it will make managing compliance easier and more efficient.
- Peace of mind for club officials accurate and up to date information
- No more spreadsheets
- Free Club Liability Insurance for Registered Clubs

ECB Free Insurance Offer

Who is eligible for insurance under the SHMS and how is the cover accessed?

- Any club that has been invited to join the SHMS. If you haven't had an invitation, speak to your County Cricket Board contact
- Clubs just need to complete the risk assessment questionnaire, accessed from the relevant screen on the SHMS
- Cover starts from the date the club's current policy expires and runs to the annual review date of 01 February
- Cover then runs annually from 01 February



ECB Free Insurance Offer

What is covered under the SHMS group insurance?

- Public Liability £15m any claim, including £2m cover for abuse
- Professional Indemnity £15m any claim and each year
- Directors and Officers Liability £2m any claim
- Employers Liability £10m any claim
- Cyber liability £50,000, including £10,000 cover for e-theft
- Legal expenses £100,000 any claim and per year





ECB Free Insurance Offer

What is not covered under the SHMS group insurance?

- Cover for club property, clubhouse, equipment, contents and machinery.
- Cover for loss of income due to an incident at the club
- Personal accident cover for club members and players
- Cover for overseas tours

Clubmark 2022

- ECB Clubmark is an accreditation scheme for cricket clubs who show:
 - Sustainability.
 - Good governance and management.
 - Promotion of a positive experience.
 - Safety and compliancy around ECB regulations.
- In 2022, Clubs are required to accredit every year, rather than on the previous 3-year cycle. However, the number of criteria has reduced and now only requires:

 - Club Development Plan.
 Open non-discriminatory constitution, which includes "Safe Hands" and ECB Antidiscrimination codes of conduct.
 Copies of AGM/EGM minutes
 Club Safeguarding Policy Statement
 Appropriate insulance ment (avidenced via Bank Statements). Appropriate insulance ment (avidenced via Bank Statements).

 - Good Financial Management (evidenced via Bank Statements & Annual Accounts)
 Good Governing Committee Structure (Evidenced via committee structure chart, 4 recent meeting minutes & latest AGM minutes).
 Compliant on the SHMS System.
- Wiltshire Clubmark Clubs Deadlines:
 - SHMS Compliance Sunday 1st May
 - Clubmark Document Upload Deadline Monday 30th May.
 - Final ECB Deadline for all the above: Thursday 30th June

Disability Cricket Champions Clubs (ECB)



The Disability Cricket Champion Club initiative is designed to help clubs create time and space for members of their community with different needs to enjoy the game of cricket.

Every Disability Cricket Champion Club will receive a free kit bag, containing playing equipment including, balls, markers and adapted items.

Clubs will be able to apply for up to £500 seed funding in their first year after providing evidence of facilitating disability cricket.

- Accessible grounds



Safeguarding

- Welcome to lestyn Lewis in newly resourced County Safeguarding Officer role
- Move from reactive to pro-active Safeguarding work, including:
 - Closer engagement with clubs to embed culture of good practice
 - To support clubs in creating a positive child centred environment
 - To ensure there is a clear referral pathway for sharing, reporting and recording concerns
 - To lead on Safeguarding education for the county
- In addition, the reactive responsibilities will continue:
 - First point of contact for clubs in response to safeguarding concerns and referrals, and act as a link between the County and ECB Safeguarding Team

Wiltshire Cricket Talent Pathway

- Launch of new Wiltshire Cricket Talent Pathway Framework
- Supported by a <u>Skills framework</u> and assisted bite-sized videos on each element of the Skills framework
- The Pathway framework and Skills frameworks should help clubs running junior cricket in a number of ways, including:
 - Understanding the technical and tactical competencies we are looking for in players at all ages and stages of the talent pathway
 - Understanding the behavioural characteristics that are being looked at in Talent Pathway cricketers
 - Understanding how Talent ID and selection works
 - Understanding what a talent pathway programme entails

Talent Pathway Support Fund (https://www.wiltshire-ccc.co.uk/support-fund.html)

- Launched to better support children who may be suffering from financial difficulties or whose family circumstances mean they are at a disadvantage relative to their pathway peers
- In the future we would love to work with clubs collaboratively on supporting pathway cricketers who may come from financial hardship



ECB Anti-Discrimination Code

Why was the code introduced?

 The Code aims to ensure that there are consistent appropriate regulations relating to discriminatory behaviour.

What does the code do?

- The Code sets out the behaviour which can lead to a breach of the regulations on discriminatory matters
- Breaches of the Code can be sanctioned through the relevant cricket organisation's disciplinary processes.

What's needed to be done?

- As a Cricket Board, we are required to adopt and implement the code. This supports our game-wide commitments to tackling discrimination in cricket.
- Adoption includes ensuring that the cricket organisations within their jurisdiction (including leagues and clubs) enforce the Anti-Discrimination Code appropriately



ECB Anti-Discrimination Code

What do clubs need to do?

- Adopt the code Make specific reference in your constitution (ready for adoption at your next AGM)
- Make your members aware Send details of the code to your members
- Encourage your participants to understand discrimination Anti-Discrimination training will be landing with the recreational game in 2022
- Confirm adoption to Wiltshire Cricket We will be asking clubs to confirm agreement to above actions

ECB General Conduct Regulations

Purpose:

 To provide a single set of regulations which sets standard of conduct that can be applied consistently throughout recreational cricket and provide assistance to cricketing organisations when establishing and running their disciplinary process

Benefits:

- Broadly the same processes and sanctions will apply to a participant wherever they are
- Contains on and off field offences
- Provides support and guidance on handling disciplinary processes

What does it mean for clubs?

• For 2022, ECB Premier Leagues and County Board run competitions will be played under the auspices of the General Conduct Regulations
